The Board Chair, Brie MacLaurin, called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. A quorum was established.

REVIEW OF AGENDA

Director Drenda Niemann noted that the presentation on Immunization Services needed to be rescheduled for January as the presenter, Shelly Maag, was ill.

MINUTES

Lisa Kaufman

Board Chair, Brie MacLaurin, asked if there were any corrections or additions to the October 24, 2024 minutes. The Board Chair requested we add to the minutes a note regarding the suggestion that was made at the October meeting for annual training and training for new members. With that addition, minutes were accepted by the board. No public comment was given.

BOARD MEMBER DISCUSSION

National Association of Local Boards of Health Effectiveness Assessment: Chair MacLaurin led the assessment discussion, fostering a lively discussion among Board members, who praised department achievements, particularly under Drenda's guidance. Board member, Sheri Ohs-Mosley, noted that there's much to absorb as a new Board member, and the resources provided have been excellent; the rest will come with experience. Board member, Chanan Brown, proposed that the Board should ensure at least one member attends local events to sustain a community presence.

<u>Water Quality Protection District (WQPD) FY 24 Annual Report:</u> Jennifer McBroom, WQPD Supervisor, reviewed the FY 24 Annual Report with the Board. In general, she mentioned the district is now fully staffed, reviewed details on the Grizzly Gulch revitalization project, and had a general discussion over the boundaries of WQPD.

<u>Behavioral Health Systems Improvement Update:</u> Jolene Jennings, Behavioral Health Systems Improvement Specialist, provided an overview of the Mobile Crisis Response Team (MCRT) services and highlighted the significance of expanded Medicaid for the sustainability of these services. Brie MacLaurin asked about MCRT

staffing, while Chanan Brown questioned the training law enforcement receives to build their skills for appropriately responding to a behavioral health crisis situation. It was mentioned that Journey Home has yet to open but is expected to do so in the first quarter of 2025. All are welcome at the Behavioral Health Local Advisory Council (LAC) meetings on the first Tuesday of the Month at 11:30am via zoom.

<u>Medicaid Expansion Report:</u> Director Niemann, provided insights on the approaching legislative session, noting that Montana Medicaid Expansion is nearing expiration and will need reauthorization by the Montana Legislature. The group highlighted the significance of maintaining this program for access to care. Brie MacLaurin proposed the Board endorse Medicaid Expansion reauthorization and prompted Director Niemann to prepare a resolution for the Board's consideration at the January meeting.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

<u>Invisible Shield Documentary:</u> A brief conversation occurred regarding the last showing and the balance of viewership (public health advocates vs general public). Sherri Ohs-Mosely recommended that the Board explore a more thorough educational approach to vaccinations for the community, highlighting a lack of comprehensive information addressing both sides. She indicated her intention to draft a proposal for the Board to review in Spring 2025. Montana Families for Vaccines will host a reception before the final showing on January 7, 2025.

Director Niemann invited the Board to the upcoming Zoom presentation about the Licensed Establishment proposed fee increase, mentioning that Confluence Public Health Alliance, statewide association, will spearhead a legislative bill for this fee increase in the 2025 session.

 No. There are currently no wastewater treatment systems available that would allow this site to meet the minimum County requirements.

 No other options exist since it's not possible for the Applicant to lower the groundwater table. The County understands that this area (given proximity to Lake Helena) has a shallow groundwater table. In speaking with the Sanitarian's office, based on firsthand experience in that area, it's not anticipated that a neighboring property would have lower groundwater. Based on property values and land desire, it's not anticipated that if neighboring groundwater was lower, that a neighbor would be willing to provide an easement for Mr. Sylvia's wastewater system. Doing so would limit neighboring parcel's land use.
- 8. Explain how the granting of this variance will not adversely affect public health, safety, and welfare.

 The proposed system would be a professionally engineered elevated sound mound (ESM) treatment system that will overcome the lack of natural vertical separation through the use of imported fill with an advanced treatment unit. Please see the attached information for a more detailed explanation.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION RELATED TO APPLICANT'S RESPONSIBILITIES AS THEY RELATE TO PUBLIC HEALTH, SAFETY, AND WELFARE:

ELEVATED SAND MOUNDS (ESM):

An ESM wastewater treatment system is considered an advanced system, especially when compared to a standard gravity system which served the previous residential structure since the 1970s. While the house was still being lived in with the previous wastewater system, there was no evidence that the system was polluting the water supply or any state waters. Test results from July 30, 2024 by the previous owner (Vincelli) showed the following:

- 1. Absent for total coliform
- 2. Absent for E-Coli
- 3. N, Nitrate + Nitrites = 0.02 mg/L

Current (11-13-24) test results by the current owner (Sylvia) showed the following:

- 1. Absent for total coliform
- 2. Absent for E-Coli
- 3. N, Nitrate + Nitrites = 0.00 mg/L (non-detect)

A professionally engineered and constructed ESM would not create a public health hazard by creating access to insects, rodents, or other carriers of human waste. These systems, although elevated, are still covered with earthen material. These systems are not easily accessible to people or animals. Access to drainfield components would require a lot of handwork (shovel) or some type of mechanical excavator.

ESM's do not violate any applicable laws or regulations. They are relatively common in Montana and are an acceptable method for onsite wastewater treatment. Montana DEQ Circular 4 provides regulations and standards for onsite Subsurface Wastewater Treatment Systems. This is documented in Chapter 6, subsection 6.7. The professional design for the proposed ESM would meet all applicable County requirements as well as Subsection 6.7 of DEQ Circular 4, in its entirety. This would include professional installer certification and Engineer Certification and As-Built drawings.

An ESM does not cause a nuisance due to odor or aesthetic condition as the system is still subsurface. While the drainfield lies beneath a mound, we do not feel this creates an unsightly appearance.

HARDSHIP CREATED IF VARIANCE IS NOT GRANTED:

If the Applicant doesn't receive a BOH variance, it's not possible to receive a Conditional Use Permit from Lewis and Clark County. A CUP is needed to construct a commercial-use facility on this parcel. While the parcel does have an approved variance that runs with the land, it's specifically written for a 3-br residential structure. If the Applicant receives this variance, he will proceed with a CUP application and has already held a Pre-Application meeting with County Planning.

The City of Helena does not have ample commercial spaces for rent or lease. The Applicant is not interested in renting due to extreme commercial costs. The current avg cost/sf/yr for commercial space in Helena = \$22-\$25. For a 7,000sf building, average annual rent = \$164,500. This does not include initial building improvement costs that would be necessary to suit the Applicant's business. Assuming rent does not increase, in 5 years that total amount = \$822,500. This is substantial money for the Applicant. Buying or renting commercial property in the City of Helena is not an option for the Applicant. With self-performing work on much of the structure, the Applicant hopes to construct a building for around this cost (not including the land investment already made). Given the option to spend this amount on renting or owning, the Applicant prefers to own.

A financial hardship would certainly be created if the variance is not approved because the Applicant will not have an opportunity to construct on this parcel. The Applicant would be forced to sell this parcel and commence another search for commercial-use property in Lewis and Clark County. The Applicant's previous search for property began in 2019 and ended this fall when he closed on this property. The Applicant loves this property and loves this location and believes it would serve his business and the residents of Lewis and Clark County very, very well. The location is ideal for the Applicant because it serves as an ideal central location not only to the valley, but also Helena.

The Applicant strongly believes that his request is not more than the minimum needed to address the high groundwater condition. This is a variance request to not meet one requirement. Professionally engineered ESMs were originally designed to be used in shallow groundwater situations like this one.

The previous design daily wastewater flow = 300gpd. The projected design daily wastewater flow = 170gpd. This equates to a decrease of 47,450 gallons in a calendar year. Assuming even less weekend use by the commercial facility, this number increases to over 50,000 gallons of (less) effluent on an annual basis. This is substantially less effluent volume leaching into the ground due to a change from residential use to conditional commercial use.

DISCUSSION:

1820 Lincoln Road East is a 3.00 acre tract of land that was created by deed in April, 1952. The parcel is located less than one-tenth of a mile east of Glass Drive on the north side of Lincoln Road East in the north Helena Valley. The parcel was developed in 1970 with a log cabin, spring-fed well and septic system. The home has been demolished due to disrepair and the original septic system has been abandoned. In August, 2024, the Board of Health approved a variance for the installation of a replacement septic system with less than 4 feet to seasonally high groundwater. The owners

of the property, Steve and Penny Vincelli, sold the property to Mr. Sylvia in October 2024. The August variance approval was for one single family home. Mr. Sylvia is proposing a commercial shop and office for his drywall business. Because this is a change in use from the original approval, a new variance must be requested by the applicant.

Historically, this property, and the area in general, has been used for agricultural purposes and has a shallow groundwater table. The Helena Valley Irrigation Canal is located three-quarters of a mile to the North and the confluence of Prickly Pear, Tenmile, and Silver Creek is 2 miles to the southeast before they enter Lake Helena. There is a spring-fed well on the property and is located approximately 150 feet upgradient of the proposed system. A second well on the property is proposed to be abandoned. Based on the US Geological Survey and other interpretive data, the direction of groundwater flow moves in a southeast direction towards Lake Helena. There is no mapped or designated floodplain in the vicinity.

The land use surrounding this parcel, and down gradient from the proposed system, is largely agricultural, irrigated hay and alfalfa fields with low-density residential and commercial dwellings.

Groundwater monitoring was conducted on the parcel in spring and summer, 2024. Three monitoring wells were installed and all three wells peaked at less than 4 feet to groundwater. The shallowest water level recorded is in Well # 1 at 3.41 feet below ground surface.

Lewis and Clark County Onsite Wastewater Treatment Regulations, Section 4.3(5) state: "Wastewater treatment systems must be located to maximize the vertical separation distance from the bottom of the absorption trench to the seasonally high groundwater level, bedrock, or other limiting layer, but under no circumstances may this vertical separation be less than four feet of natural soil."

A site evaluation was completed at this site on August 24, 2022. Soils at the site are sandy clay loams and clay loams with 10-25% gravel content. This soil type typically provides good wastewater treatment. There are no down gradient wells for over 1 mile in the direction of groundwater flow.

The shop will be used to store drywall and other business-related equipment. The building will have an office with a bathroom for staff. There is no industrial waste produced at the site and the maximum number of users per day is 13. In accordance with Table 3.1-1 of DEQ Circular-4, an average wastewater flow for an office is 13 gallons per day/user. The total wastewater flow is

calculated to be 170 gallons per day. The previous variance was approved based on a residential flow of 300 gallons per day. This is a decreased wastewater flow of 43%.

The parcel is not subject to the non-degradation requirements under the Montana Water Quality Act. There was an existing source of wastewater on the parcel in existence prior to April 29, 1993, and the proposed use is not an increased source of wastewater flow from the previous system. New water samples were collected for the existing well on the property. Water sample results taken on November 13, 2024, showed the following:

- 1. Absent for total coliform
- 2. Absent for e-coli
- 3. N, nitrate + nitrite =0.00 mg/L (non-detect)

The Vincelli's submitted water quality results for their Ausut 2024 variance request and the results were similar:

- 1. Absent for total coliform
- 2. Absent for e-coli
- 3. N, nitrate + nitrite =0.02 mg/L and the nitrate level was 0.02 mg/L.

The human health standard for nitrate is 10 mg/L.

The applicant is proposing to install an Elevated Sand Mound constructed on 12 inches of stabilized fill material to serve a commercial dry storage shop with a bathroom. This amount of fill would provide more than four feet of soil prior to the placement of the Elevated Sand Mound. The design flow is not to exceed 170 gallons per day.

While an elevated sand mound is no longer classified as a Level II treatment system, it has been shown to remove higher levels of some wastewater contaminants than a standard system. This includes nitrogen, total suspended solids, biological oxygen demand, bacteria and viruses.

The proposed system will require a design by a Professional Engineer and tank buoyancy calculations will have to be completed to ensure that the septic tank and dose tank will not become dislodged or shift during the high groundwater season.

This parcel is located in a Lewis and Clark County Zoning area that restricts the use of a commercial shop. This area is defined as Rural Residential Mixed Use and will require a Conditional Use Permit prior to construction. The septic permit cannot be issued until the Board of Adjustments approves their application.

There are currently no other available options available to the applicant such as an easement onto an adjoining property, connection to a public system or an alternative site that can meet the depth to groundwater requirements. This area of the Helena Valley is historically an area of higher groundwater tables. The proposed system is expected to be the best option for protection of public health and water quality for these site conditions.

CONCLUSION:

This parcel cannot meet the 4-foot separation to the seasonal high groundwater requirement as outlined in Section 4.3(5) of the Lewis and Clark County Onsite Wastewater Treatment Regulations. The applicant is proposing to install an Elevated Sand Mound constructed on 12 inches of fill to serve no more than 13 users per day at a maximum design flow of 170 gallons per day. There are no available alternatives that can meet the requirements of the regulations. All other minimum state and county requirements can be met.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that if the variance were to be granted, that the following conditions shall be met:


- 1. That the use on the parcel shall be limited to one commercial shop with a maximum wastewater design flow of 170 gallons per day.
- 2. That wastewater shall be limited to residential strength and no industrial or high strength waste shall be discharged to the system.
- 3. That the system be designed by a Professional Engineer and that tank buoyancy calculations be included in the design.

- 4. That a minimum of 12 inches of fill be placed between the natural ground surface and the elevated sand mound;
- 5. That the second well on the property be properly abandoned by a licensed well driller;
- 6. That a Conditional Use Permit application be approved by the Board of Adjustments prior to the issuance of a septic system permit.
- 7. That the variance will expire 2 years from date of approval.

FINDINGS OF FACT Arthur A. Sylvia Variance Request

On January 23, 2025, a hearing was held before the Lewis and Clark City-County Board of Health to consider granting a variance from the current regulations governing on-site wastewater treatment to Arthur A. Sylvia. The applicant requested to install a replacement on-site wastewater treatment system at a site with less than four feet of natural separation between the ground surface and the seasonal high water table.

Based on the record established at this hearing, the Lewis and Clark City-County Board of Health now make the following findings of fact:

- 1. The parcel is 3.00 acres in size.
- 2. The parcel is located at 1820 Lincoln Road East in the north Helena Valley.
- 3. The parcel was created by deed in 1952.
- 4. The parcel was developed in 1970 with a log cabin, spring-fed well and septic system.
- 5. The septic system was installed prior to septic system permitting requirements.
- 6. A variance was previously approved for the site in August 2024 for a single-family home.
- 7. The property was sold to Mr. Sylvia in October 2024.
- 8. The proposed change of use is for a commercial shop and office for a drywall business.
- 9. There are no down-gradient wells for over 1 mile from the proposed replacement system.
- 10. There are no down-gradient surface waters for 2 miles from the proposed system.
- 11. There is no mapped or designated floodway or 100-year floodplain in the vicinity.
- 12. The land use surrounding this parcel, and down gradient from the proposed system, is largely agricultural, irrigated hay and alfalfa fields with low-density residential and commercial dwellings.
- 13. Ground water depths were monitored on the parcel in the spring and summer of 2024.
- 14. The shallowest groundwater level observed was 3.37 feet below ground surface in monitoring well #3.
- 15. The soils at the proposed treatment system site are sandy clay loams and clay loams.
- 16. The site is not subject to the non-degradation requirements of the Montana Water Quality Act.
- 17. Water quality samples were absent of total coliform and e-coli and the nitrate level was 0.0 mg/L (non-detect).
- 18. There is no industrial or high strength waste that will be produced at the site.

- 19. The maximum daily wastewater flow will be 170 gallons per day.
- 20. The proposed replacement system will consist of an Elevated Sand Mound.
- 21. The proposed Elevated Sand Mound will be constructed on 12 inches of stabilized fill.
- 22. The entire system will be designed by a Professional Engineer.
- 23. Tank buoyancy calculations will determined by a Professional Engineer.
- 24. The site will require a Conditional Use Permit from Lewis and Clark County Community Development and Planning.
- 25. There are currently no other available options available to the applicant such as an easement onto an adjoining property, connection to a public system or an alternative site that can meet the depth to groundwater requirements.

Based on the findings of fact, the Lewis and Clark City-County Board of Health now makes the following conclusions of law:

- The proposed onsite wastewater treatment system will not contaminate any actual or potential drinking water supply;
- 2. The proposed onsite wastewater treatment system will not cause a public health hazard as a result of access to insects, rodents, or other possible carriers of disease to humans;
- 3. The proposed onsite wastewater treatment system will not cause a public health hazard by being accessible to persons or animals;
- 4. The proposed onsite wastewater treatment system will not violate any law or regulation governing water pollution or wastewater treatment and disposal, including the rules contained in ARM 17.36.901 through 17.36.924, except for the rule that the variance is requested from;
- 5. The proposed onsite wastewater treatment system will not pollute or contaminate state waters in violation of 75-5-605, MCA;
- 6. The proposed onsite wastewater treatment system will not degrade state waters unless authorized pursuant to 75-5-303, MCA;
- 7. The proposed onsite wastewater treatment system will not cause a nuisance due to odor, unsightly appearance or other aesthetic consideration;
- 8. Not granting this variance will result in undue hardship to the applicant;
- 9. Granting of this variance addresses extraordinary conditions that the applicant could not reasonably have prevented;
- 10. There are no reasonably feasible alternatives other than the variance granted, and,
- 11. The variance granted is not more than the minimum needed to address the extraordinary conditions.

Based on the facts and conclusions presented above, the Lewis and Clark City-County Board of Health recommends the variance be granted.

- 6) That the system be designed by a Professional Engineer and that tank buoyancy calculations be included in the design.
- 7) That a minimum of 12 inches of fill be placed between the natural ground surface and the elevated sand mound;
- 8) That the second well on the property be properly abandoned by a licensed well driller;
- 9) That a Conditional Use Permit application be approved by the Board of Adjustments prior to the issuance of a septic system permit.
- 10) That the variance will expire 2 years from date of approval.

Conflict of Interest Policy for Boards of Health

Montana Code Annotated (MCA) Title 2, Chapter 2

The foregoing consists of excerpts from the standards of conduct statutes under Title 2, Chapter 2 of the Montana Code Annotated. Care should be taken to review these statutes in their entirety.

Section 2-2-201, MCA, states in part that an employee of a governmental entity may not be interested in any contract made by them in their official capacity or by any body, agency, or board of which they are members or employees if they are directly involved with the contract.

Under section 2-2-105, MCA, a public officer or public employee may not acquire an interest in any business or undertaking that the officer or employee has reason to believe may be directly and substantially affected to its economic benefit by official action to be taken by the officer's or employee's agency. When a public employee who is a member of a quasi-judicial board or commission or of a board, commission, or committee with rulemaking authority is required to take official action on a matter as to which the public employee has a conflict created by a personal or private interest that would directly give rise to an appearance of impropriety as to the public employee's influence, benefit, or detriment in regard to the matter, the public employee shall disclose the interest creating the conflict prior to participating in the official action.

- A. Under section 2-2-104, MCA, a public employee or public official may not accept a gift of substantial value or a substantial economic benefit tantamount to a gift that:
 - 1. would tend improperly to influence a reasonable person in the person's position to depart from the faithful and impartial discharge of the person's public duties; or the person knows or that a reasonable person in that position should know under the circumstances is primarily for the purpose of rewarding the person for official action taken.
- B. **Disclos ure**—Under section 2-2-105, MCA, when a public employee who is a member of a quasi-judicial board or commission or of a board, commission, or committee with rulemaking authority is required to take official action on a matter as to which the public employee has a conflict created by a personal or private interest that would directly give rise to an appearance of impropriety as to the public employee's influence, benefit, or detriment in regard to the matter, the public employee shall disclose the interest creating the conflict prior to participating in the official action.

Under section 2-2-131, MCA, a public officer or public employee shall, prior to acting in a manner that may impinge on public duty, including the award of a permit, contract, or license, disclose the nature of the private interest that creates the conflict. The public officer or public employee shall make the disclosure in writing to the commissioner of political practices, listing the amount of private interest, if any, the purpose and duration of the person's services rendered, if any, and the compensation received for the services or other

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING MONTANA MEDICAID PROGRAM FOR ALL MONTANANS

WHEREAS, the Montana Legislature passed the Health and Economic Livelihood Partnership (HELP) Act to expand Medicaid coverage in 2015 allowing thousands of Montanans access to affordable health care for the first time; and

WHEREAS, the Montana Legislature voted to continue expanded Medicaid in 2019 so Montana adults aged 19-64 with incomes up to 138% of the federal poverty level could maintain their health insurance coverage; and

WHEREAS, Medicaid Expansion eligibility for a family of three in 2024 is \$35,632; and

WHEREAS, in Lewis and Clark County traditional Medicaid covers 4,642 children and 2,814 adults and Medicaid Expansion covers another 4,304 adults for a total of 17% of the county's population able to access healthcare because of Medicaid as of July 2024¹; and

WHEREAS, 910 Lewis and Clark business, 56%, employed workers on expanded Medicaid²; and

WHEREAS, Medicaid expansion provided Lewis and Clark County residents with: 3,338 new patient and preventative services, 244 diabetes treatments, 345 breast cancer screenings, 2,151 mental health outpatient services, and 520 substance use disorder outpatient treatment²; and

WHEREAS, Medicaid expansion is particularly essential for rural communities. Two-thirds of Medicaid expansion enrollees live in rural communities, and uncompensated care at critical access hospitals and rural health clinics has declined by 35% since Medicaid expansion passed³; and

WHEREAS, 96% of Montana Medicaid enrollees work lower income jobs like agriculture, construction, hospitality, and childcare, live with a chronic illness or disability, care for a family member, or attend school⁴; and

WHEREAS, Medicaid expansion helped create and sustain over 7,500 new jobs, generated an estimated \$475 million in new personal income, and fueled \$775 million in economic activity in 2022³; and

WHEREAS, Medicaid expansion keeps the state budget healthy. After expansion, states need to spend less of their state budget on uncompensated care to hospitals, traditional Medicaid, and corrections. In the state fiscal year 2022, the Montana estimated that Medicaid expansion saved the state \$27 million because of a higher federal match rate for some existing Medicaid populations who were transferred to Medicaid expansion, offsetting a quarter of the expansion costs. In total, Medicaid expansion continues to infuse over \$900 million in new federal spending into Montana annual, creating jobs and economic activity³; and

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Lewis and Clark City-County Board of Health supports the permanent reauthorization of Medicaid expansion for individuals with income level up to 138% of the federal poverty level in Montana; and

Be it further resolved that the Lewis and Clark City-County Board of Health will join other health organizations to advocate at the state level to permanently expand Medicaid for individuals with income level up to 138% of the federal poverty level in Montana; and

Be it further resolved that the Lewis and Clark City-County Board of Health strongly urges the Montana Legislature to vote to permanently reauthorize the Montana Medicaid Program because it supports Montana's health care system, strengthens our labor force, improves our economy, and supports access to care for all Montanans.

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING HB XXX AN UPDATE TO LICENSED ESTABLISHMENT FEES

WHEREAS, pursuant to Montana Code Annotated 2023, Title 50, Chapters 50-53, 57, local health departments are required to make inspections for retail food establishments, wholesale food establishments, hotels, motels, rooming houses, tourist campgrounds, trailer courts, public swimming pools and swimming areas for the purpose of promoting health and safety in facilities and protecting the community, providing guidance and training for safe facility operations, advising on best practices to protect the public and the operation, and to assure compliance with current rules and regulations; and

WHEREAS, license fees are set in state law and have not increased since 2009; and

WHEREAS, inflation has increased costs of licensed establishment programs by 137%, county growth has increased the number of licensed facilities by over 6% and increased the workload by 12%; and

WHEREAS, in 2023, state-mandated licensed establishment inspection programs cost more than 4.1 million in local tax dollars in only 35 of the 56 Montana counties representing 88% of Montana's population. That's 75% of the program covered by local property taxes and only 18% covered by license fees; and

WHEREAS, the current fee structure requires a retail food establishment with three employees to pay the same fee as a large establishment with more than eleven employees regardless of the risk factors present or the time it takes the sanitarian to conduct a thorough inspection of the facility, creating inequities among licensed retail food facilities; and

WHEREAS, public accommodations like hotels and motels that serve food are not currently required to have a food license; and

WHEREAS, HB XXX proposes a balanced and fair approach to licensed establishment fees that keeps up with inflation, accounts for complexity in inspections, right sizes local programs for business growth and ensures fairness; and

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Lewis and Clark City-County Board of Health supports the proposed adjustments in HB XXX to the licensed establishment fees; and

Be it further resolved that the Lewis and Clark City-County Board of Health will join other health organizations to advocate at the state level to adjust licensed establishment fees as proposed in HB XXX; and

Be it further resolved that the Lewis and Clark City-County Board of Health strongly urges the Montana Legislature to vote for the proposed adjustments in state statute to the licensed establishment fees.

License Establishments Category and Rate Adjustments

License establishment fees are set in state law and have not increased for 15 years, since 2009.


Without an adjustment by the State Legislature, counties will continue to fund an increasing portion of the cost of local Licensed Establishment Programs <u>and</u> many smaller Montana businesses with less complex food safety needs will continue to pay the same amount as more complex, often larger establishments.

Inspections performed by Registered Sanitarians protect the public from foodborne illness, maintain clean environments including hygienic spas and pools, and support businesses in selling safe products and services to consumers. Local sanitarians strive to be a valued collaborator with businesses to promote safety through consultation, licensing, inspections, education, and, when necessary, compliance actions.

Current Program Funding

Licensed establishment inspection program costs are covered by*:

- 75 percent is funded by local property taxes.
- 18 percent is reimbursed through annual license fees.



 7 percent of costs are reimbursed by local fees only used by some counties (temporary food service permits, plan review).

County costs of this state-mandated program have gone up significantly – an average of 137 percent – among counties that reported information for 2008 and 2023. Since 2009, the cost of living alone has increased by 46 percent.**

The proposed changes would fund local programs via a closer 50-50 split between local sources and license fees.

Balanced and Fair Proposal

The proposed changes keep up with inflation, account for complexity in inspections, rightsize local programs for business growth and ensure fairness.

- Account for inflation and complexity in <u>all</u> establishment types.
- Add two new categories of retail food establishments: Retail food medium and extra large.
- Require hotels and motels that serve food to get a retail food license.
- Require higher fees for pools and spas that operate year-round, rather than seasonally.
- Add a unique category for mobile food trucks.
- Add an annual inflationary adjustment rate.

1. Why get vaccinated?

Polio vaccine can prevent polio.

Polio (or poliomyelitis) is a disabling and lifethreatening disease caused by poliovirus, which can infect a person's spinal cord, leading to paralysis.

Most people infected with poliovirus have no symptoms, and many recover without complications. Some people will experience sore throat, fever, tiredness, nausea, headache, or stomach pain.

A smaller group of people will develop more serious symptoms that affect the brain and spinal cord:

- Paresthesia (feeling of pins and needles in the legs),
- Meningitis (infection of the covering of the spinal cord and/or brain), or
- Paralysis (can't move parts of the body) or weakness in the arms, legs, or both.

Paralysis is the most severe symptom associated with polio because it can lead to permanent disability and death.

Improvements in limb paralysis can occur, but in some people new muscle pain and weakness may develop 15 to 40 years later. This is called "post-polio syndrome."

Polio has been eliminated from the United States, but it still occurs in other parts of the world. The best way to protect yourself and keep the United States polio-free is to maintain high immunity (protection) in the population against polio through vaccination.

2. Polio vaccine

Children should usually get 4 doses of polio vaccine at ages 2 months, 4 months, 6–18 months, and 4–6 years.

Most **adults** do not need polio vaccine because they were already vaccinated against polio as children. Some adults are at higher risk and should consider polio vaccination, including:

- People traveling to certain parts of the world
- · Laboratory workers who might handle poliovirus
- Health care workers treating patients who could have polio
- Unvaccinated people whose children will be receiving oral poliovirus vaccine (for example, international adoptees or refugees)

Polio vaccine may be given as a stand-alone vaccine, or as part of a combination vaccine (a type of vaccine that combines more than one vaccine together into one shot).

Polio vaccine may be given at the same time as other vaccines.



3. Talk with your health care provider

Tell your vaccination provider if the person getting the vaccine:

 Has had an allergic reaction after a previous dose of polio vaccine, or has any severe, lifethreatening allergies

In some cases, your health care provider may decide to postpone polio vaccination until a future visit.

People with minor illnesses, such as a cold, may be vaccinated. People who are moderately or severely ill should usually wait until they recover before getting polio vaccine.

Not much is known about the risks of this vaccine for pregnant or breastfeeding people. However, polio vaccine can be given if a pregnant person is at increased risk for infection and requires immediate protection.

Your health care provider can give you more information.

4. Risks of a vaccine reaction

• A sore spot with redness, swelling, or pain where the shot is given can happen after polio vaccination.

People sometimes faint after medical procedures, including vaccination. Tell your provider if you feel dizzy or have vision changes or ringing in the ears.

As with any medicine, there is a very remote chance of a vaccine causing a severe allergic reaction, other serious injury, or death.

5. What if there is a serious problem?

An allergic reaction could occur after the vaccinated person leaves the clinic. If you see signs of a severe allergic reaction (hives, swelling of the face and throat, difficulty breathing, a fast heartbeat, dizziness, or weakness), call **9-1-1** and get the person to the nearest hospital.

For other signs that concern you, call your health care provider.

Adverse reactions should be reported to the Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS). Your health care provider will usually file this report, or you can do it yourself. Visit the VAERS website at www.vaers.hhs.gov or call 1-800-822-7967. VAERS is only for reporting reactions, and VAERS staff members do not give medical advice.

6. The National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program

The National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program (VICP) is a federal program that was created to compensate people who may have been injured by certain vaccines. Claims regarding alleged injury or death due to vaccination have a time limit for filing, which may be as short as two years. Summary of Assessment



Mental Health and Substance Use:

- Rates of depression and suicide remain high and are major concerns in our community
- Access to health care services is limited due to long wait times, limited providers, and limited insurance coverage
- Substance use remains a top concern, with relatively high rates of binge drinking and tobacco use in our community
- Alcohol-related mortality rate increased significantly in recent years
- Substance use among youth has decreased in recent years



Housing

- The significant rising cost burden of housing across income levels remains a critical issue in our community
- Both renters and owners are impacted, especially those with lower incomes
- This issue contributes to further economic stress and affects both physical and mental health

Major challenges include:

- Labor shortages, construction challenges, wage-cost-ofliving discrepancies, and slow governmental policy responses.
- Influx of out-of-state buyers
- "NIMBYism," and stigma/ discrimination against homelessness
- Issues within public housing programs, such as limited voucheraccepting homes and hesitant landlords
- Insufficient public transportation, funding, and staffing for nonprofits supporting housing efforts

Chronic Disease

- Incidence of male prostate cancer has increased
- Mortality rate of colon cancer has increased
- Female breast cancer mortality rate has decreased
- Emergency department visit rates for heart disease have increased, with no major changes in mortality rate
- The percentage of residents diagnosed with diabetes has increased
- Efforts to address risk factors like smoking, physical inactivity, and diet remain vital to reducing these rates and improving quality of life



Access to Healthcare

- Provider-to-population ratios are better than state and national averages in our county, but access issues persist
- Many residents report delays in care due to long wait times, insurance coverage limitations, and transportation barriers, especially in rural areas
- Lack of access to dental care, particularly due to a lack of providers accepting Medicaid, is a major barrier
- Uncertainty in the future of Medicaid coverage and renewal of our current Medicaid program for our community is a concern




